**ISUMA's video installation in the Canada** Pavilion, One Day in the Life of Noah Piugattuk, recreates an encounter on Baffin Island in April 1961, when one Inuit family was ordered to move off the land. From the same place, 58 years later, Isuma webcasts Silakut Live From the Floe Edge, about the mining company proposing to build a railroad across Baffin Island, to ship 30 million tons of iron ore annually by supertanker through walrus breeding grounds within view of Piugattuk's former home site at Kapuivik.

**IGLOOLIK AT THE DAWN** of the first millennium, when nomadic Inuit were masters of the frozen arctic. Evil in the form of an unknown shaman divides a small community of Inuit, upsetting its balance and spirit. As twenty years pass, two brothers emerge from the evil order: Amaqjuaq, "the strong one", and Atanarjuat, "the fast runner." Atarnarjuat wins the hand of the lovely Atuat away from the boastful son of the camp leader, Oki, who vows to get even. Oki ambushes the brothers in their sleep, killing Amaqjuaq, as Atanarjuat miraculously escapes, running naked over the spring sea ice. But can he ever escape the cycle of vengeance left behind? Atanarjuat holds the distinction of being the first feature film made in the Inuktitut language, and winner of the Camera d'Or at the Cannes Film Festival in 2001. (Inuktitut/English)

JANUARY 1922. With powerful forces of a new century pressing in around them, Danish explorer and scientist Knud Rasmussen visits the isolated camp of the great Iglulik shaman, Aua. For Rasmussen and his protegé the young anthropologist Therkel Mathiassen, arriving at Aua's family camp is like falling into paradise — an arctic Garden of Eden with an intoxicating mix of spiritual and physical vitality, joyful intelligence and exuberant generosity. What the Danes don't realize is that Aua's temporary fortress of beauty and tranguillity stands surrounded by the steamroller of the 20th century: the introduction of Inuit-language Christian bibles, increasing dependence of foreign trade goods,

the first police investigation of the murder of a white man, and the reality that nomadic Inuit can't stay in one place - even if there's nowhere safe to go. (Inuktitut/English/Danish)

Before Tomorrow is directed by Marie-Hélène Cousineau and Madeline Ivalu, from a script by Susan Avingag, Marie-Hélène Cousineau and Madeline Ivalu, adapted from the novel For morgendagen by the acclaimed Danish writer Jørn Riel. Before Tomorrow is a moving drama about a strong Inuit woman who demonstrates that human dignity is at the core of life from beginning to end, as she faces -with her beloved grandson-the ultimate challenge of survival. NUNAVUT. CIRCA 1913. Kuanana returns from caribou hunting with his son to find his family slaughtered and his wife and daughter kidnapped. With the guidance of his father's spirit helper, the loon Kallulik. father and son set off to reunite with their family. (Inuktitut/English)

"Despite being set in the north, Maliglutit is a western through and through. It's got a harsh landscape where folk eke out an existence. a homestead vibe with each isolated igloo days apart on the tundra and a social space where individuals must enforce their own law. While the film is structured with The Searchers' kidnapping plot, Kunuk inverts specific conventions of the western genre in order to tell a more nuanced story. One with more shades of humanity, which highlights the act of revenge from an Inuit perspective in subtle, fascinating ways."

### One Day in the Life of Noah Piugattuk

IN APRIL 1961, John Kennedy is America's new President, the Cold War heats up in Berlin, and nuclear bombers are deployed from bases in arctic Canada. In Kapuivik, north Baffin Island, Noah Piugattuk's nomadic Inuit band live and hunt by dog team as his ancestors did when he was born in 1900. When the white man known as Boss arrives at Piugattuk's hunting camp, what appears as a chance meeting soon opens up the prospect of momentous change. Boss is an agent of the government, assigned to get Piugattuk to move his band to settlement housing and send his children to school so they can get jobs and make money. But Kapuivik is Piugattuk's homeland. He takes no part in the Canadian experience - and cannot imagine what his children would do with money. (Inuktitut/English)
